
POINTS TO DISCUSS WITH YOUR TEAM


DRUGS & MATERIALS - REMEMBER:

- to let us know of any broken packs, packs used in error, lost boxes etc as soon as they occur – we must know happens to the treatment packs wherever they are in the world;
- that it is important that we receive the Drug Accountability Logs and consent forms as soon as they are requested;
- to keep your study file up to date at all times with all the necessary logs and forms. The Materials Guidance sheet in front of the study file will tell you what you have to do. Inspections and audits will be much less stressful for you if everything is kept up to date.

LEARNING FROM EACH OTHER HOW TO BE SUCCESSFUL



Perspective from **Bukola Fawole, National Coordinator, Nigeria** – the highest recruiting country in the trial What inspired you to join the WOMAN trial collaboration?

I joined WOMAN at an early stage. That we do not have enough intervention studies to address the leading causes of maternal mortality has always been a painful realisation for me. Such therefore was my joy when the WOMAN trial was introduced – and that the trial was planning to address the most common cause of maternal mortality, postpartum haemorrhage!

What has been the trial's most important accomplishment in your country/ hospital so far?

The WOMAN trial is probably the largest clinical trial in maternal health thus far in Nigeria, as far as I can tell, in terms of trial size, number of collaborating institutions and scientists. It is also providing opportunities for ethical and regulatory agencies to oversee a trial of this magnitude. In this respect, it opens huge vistas of opportunities for all to grow in the art and science of clinical trials. One can say that all those involved seem to be enjoying the process. The capacity building inherent in implementing the trial, in my opinion, is the major accomplishment in Nigeria.

What would be your key advice to a new collaborator joining?

To the new collaborator, my word of advice is that running a clinical trial such as WOMAN is no tea party. Its success requires dedication, commitment, and ability to overcome challenges with innovative ideas. Challenges will indeed come from all corners. A painful observation one makes once in a while is that results of half-hearted commitment are obvious. Collaborators have come to understand that building team spirit is key to success in the long term. When all members of the team understand that they are equal stakeholders in its success, you will be overwhelmed by what can be achieved.

Overall, it has been a privilege for everyone involved in the WOMAN trial. We shall not rest on our oars until the very last patient has been recruited. The prospect of an effective Intervention for reducing morbidities and mortalities from PPH remains the driving force for our small family of collaborators in Nigeria.



What inspired you to join the WOMAN trial collaboration?

The WOMAN trial is a continuum of a long history of cooperation in performing valuable multicentre clinical studies dating back to 1998.

To me it simply represents a challenge to break barriers. How can a bunch of sincere collaborators change the guidelines of management of some major health problems through working together as a team? A similar success was never achieved by politicians and governments.



The most important accomplishment of participating in these clinical trials is to form an enthusiastic group of doctors, nurses, social workers, administrators and clerks who can work together and work with similar teams in other countries to save lives.

What would be your key advice to a new collaborator joining?

I advice new collaborators that they should not miss such a wonderful experience to share in a chain of clinical trials which may improve our current knowledge on several health problems.
