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## The WOMAN trial team is now complete

"I urge all of our collaborators to continue the effort to make sure we complete recruitment of 20,000 women by March 2016."

Professor Mohamed Ahmed A El Sheikh, National Coordinator and Consultant Obstetrician and Gynaecologist at Soba University Hospital in the Sudan explains why the WOMAN trial is so relevant

"The Sudan, a large country with diverse cultures and difficult unpaved roads, has scarce obstetric services run by different levels of health care providers. We have joined the WOMAN trial as it probes yet another novel method for the management of postpartum haemorrhage (PPH). As an

international, well designed study it is conducted in many countries in which the obstetrics services are similar to our situation. The trial started in the Sudan in September 2011; ten teaching hospitals participated, seven of which are now actively recruiting. Many practicing obstetricians are familiar with the trial and hoping for positive results."

PAKISTAN NATIONAL MEETING MAY 2015

Over 50 investigators attended the WOMAN trial national meeting held in Pakistan, with everyone making great contributions. It was the collective effort of all the collaborators in Pakistan that made this such a successful event.





The meeting was hosted in Rawalpindi by the National Co-ordinator for Pakistan, Professor Rizwana Chaudhri. The strategy for the remaining months was mapped out to ensure all high risk patients are randomised as early as possible using the most appropriate form of consent. Investigators took part in consent role plays, re-enacting different consent situations and working through difficult situations that may arise.













Teams from collaborating sites in Pakistan agreed to make promises to the WOMAN trial at the meeting and subsequently sent us team photos of their promises.

We hope that with all these promises made, the WOMAN team in Pakistan are able to fulfil these and see total recruitment reach 20,000 patients within the next 5 months, before trial recruitment is concluded in March 2016.



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# THE FINISH LINE IS IN SIGHT

Congratulations and thank you for reaching 18,500 patients recruited. After this massive achievement, 1500 patients in 5 months won't be a problem if we all do our very best.

You all know the statement - Success is 1% inspiration and 99% perspiration. Designing the WOMAN trial was the 1% inspiration, but it is all of you putting in the 99% perspiration has got us to 18,500 patients. As the finish line approaches, the temptation is to slow down. However, we know that many races are lost just before the finish line. We urge all of you to bring it in on time - 20,000 patients by March 2016. We have had several new countries joining us since our last global newsletter - Cote D'Ivoire, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia and Papua New Guinea; also many new sites from Kenya, Nigeria, Pakistan, Sudan, Uganda and Zambia. So we have a strong team to carry us to the end.

From now till March 2016, every doctor, midwife, nurse, researcher and trialist working on the trial knows the challenge ahead - 1500 patients in 5 months!

Our focus must also be on making sure that the right types of patients are recruited (those women who, following first line interventions, continue to bleed and are considered for additional treatments) and that you are considering randomisation of these women as early as possible - do not delay! Also, only the best quality data will do!

It gives me great pleasure to write on behalf of the Steering Committee and to extend their warm regards to collaborators. It has been a long trial but we are on the final lap due to end March 2016. As we all know, this is a historic trial and it remains significant irrespective of the findings. The Nigerian members have been privileged to be involved in both its conceptualization and recruitment.

In the next few months we need to focus on making good the promises we made at the last national collaborators meeting in Ibadan. I am aware that some centres in Nigeria were not recruiting due to various professional disputes. This should motivate the recruiting centres to make sure that our National recruitment target is met. We must recruit every eligible patient especially the high risk patients.

I believe that at the end of this trial we would have made a significant contribution to the reduction of maternal mortality through reducing PPH. We hope this trial will also provide a cheap and affordable solution to this enormous More importantly problem.
